Business Economics

Overview of the Major

The world we live in has a serious scarcity of resources. If we all could have unlimited access to goods, such as breathable air or drinkable water, the world would operate much smoother. However, since these resources are not abundant, we need to create an order of allocation to avoid conflicts or war (economics). Simultaneously, organizations and individuals prioritize certain economic activities in order to make a living by producing, buying, and selling commodities and services (business). Thus, by combining these core fundamentals, the Business Economics major was born.

Due to the vast array of fields in Business Economics, the major at TIU is separated into five concentration modules. Students will learn the diverse ways of analyzing economic activities that go beyond national boundaries, such as international trade and finance, while developing the actual skills to assess and determine order for the allocation of scarce resources. In addition, the many components of business will be thoroughly analyzed, while utilizing state-of-the-art IT to develop the skills to analyze markets and make the decisions required to build an organization with sound management. Mastery of the concepts found in the two core fields of business and economics will provide numerous opportunities in companies, ventures, banks, and consulting firms, among other global organizations, as well as a clear path towards an MBA or other advanced degrees.



I enjoy teaching in the E-Track Program because discussions are always interesting and I get to learn new perspectives from our diverse student body. I feel a major advantage of our program is this global perspective that students encounter throughout their time here. In my classes, I try to have discussions where students can share how their lived experiences align with or differ from theories taught in class. We also look at cases and analyze them together (for example, by using SWOT analysis) to deepen understanding of how concepts learned in class play out in the real world of business. Emerging business leaders need to be able to communicate cross-culturally and analyze complexities from an informed perspective. I believe our program offers a solid opportunity for students to gain such skills, both in and out of class.

Faculty Highlight



During my bachelor's degree, I originally thought I would search for a career in designing environmental regulations. Before graduating, I had the opportunity to intern for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and work with a senior economist in my department. I learned that what I wanted to do required advanced analytical tools from statistics and economics, and reorganized my last few semesters to prepare for graduate school in economics. In graduate school, I began studying pesticides under the mentorship of my advisor, which eventually turned into an interest in the agricultural production process as a whole. I am particularly excited to be part of the E-Track program at TIU, which I believe offers students several benefits, but perhaps the most unique of these is the cultural exposure they receive, both to Japanese culture as well as to their peers from dozens of other countries. Our students not only become more conscientious global citizens, but can also leverage their cross-cultural experiences in our progressively more globalized world. Currently, I teach introductory economics and statistics, courses that I believe are invaluable to all students regardless of their field of study. I also teach a class on agricultural supply chains, which – like our economies in general – have become increasingly complex over time.

# Digital Business & Innovation

## Overview of the Major

Technology is leading the future and changing businesses everywhere. The Digital Business & Innovation (DBI) major was created to help today's students adapt to the current workforce by building a bridge between business and technology. What this means is that students will obtain knowledge on how to innovate products, services, and business models by using new technology. Students will learn how to identify and conceptualize key technologies and platforms as well as how to adapt these to foster business innovation.

DBI is separated into six concentration modules focusing on different areas of digital business. Be it fintech, AI, programming, entrepreneurship, or business management, this major offers focus areas for anyone interested in a future-forward education. Graduates will be able to land positions in several fields at globally prestigious companies that are leading the future, or move on and obtain an MBA in the same area of study.

Teaching and research are two faces of my academic life which closely support each other. For my research, I love to be inspired by the courses I am teaching, and I love to teach something related to what I am researching. My research field is nano-quantum technologies, and teaching computer networks, for example, makes a great fit as I have been conducting research for developing future quantum networks. 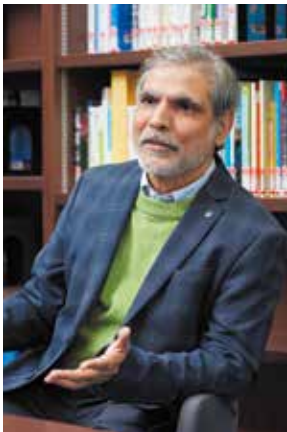

After getting my PhD in CSE from IIT Kharagpur, I got the opportunity to contribute to the success of different organizations through AI research. I was the research brain behind two multi-hundred million USD success stories. I successfully founded and exited two AI start-ups. I helped over two dozen organizations to build AI products that wrote unprecedented business success stories. My pioneering AI and ML research in the last three decades proliferated into 300+ research papers, one dozen plus patents, 14 popular books including two bestselling titles, and guidance to 20 PhD candidates. This created a solid platform for me to help budding students at TIU to create history. DBI at TIU strikes the balance between business innovation and intelligent technologies to empower students to become modern era business warriors. The international culture, hunger to solve problems and thirst for innovative thinking facilitated with intelligent technologies help them to be different, innovative and most importantly practical. ## Faculty Highlight



University life is all about learning – and not all learning happens in the classroom. A portion of the DBI faculty own and partner in running ventures in Japan and abroad, enabling their advice and teaching material to be crafted towards the market’s demand. During the winter break, I guide a team of students through an internship in digital advertising and e-commerce management with companies based in Tokyo and remotely in London. Internships help students shape a competitive CV and develop soft skills necessary in the workplace. Another out-of-class learning opportunity happens through extracurricular activities which grow students’ talents and leadership skills, and help them explore new interests. Extracurricular activities also offer unique opportunities to bond with other students and faculty members. The E-track Knowledge Bowl is an example of an intellectually stimulating extracurricular activity that I organize annually with students and faculty. In the classroom, my courses have students undergo experiential learning by implementing an engaging pedagogy based on practical projects with an emphasis on higher order thinking. For example, in the entrepreneurial strategy course, students create a fully functional e-commerce site and devise a well-rounded digital advertising plan. The teaching pedagogy of my DBI courses surpasses basic observation of facts and data interpretation, and it deliberately stimulates discussion and critical thinking.

## Partnership with the European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN)



TIU established a Memorandum of Understanding with CERN in Switzerland, becoming its third official cooperating organization in Japan. The design research for this project has involved over 1,300 professionals from over 150 universities, research institutes, and corporations from around the world. # International Relations

## Overview of the Major

International Relations is a field of study dealing with how nations with varying power, interests, and identity interact with each other in the absence of a global government. The discipline originated in the tragic experience of World War I, when unprecedented devastation called for a systematic inquiry into the causes of war and conditions for peace. Since then, the range of issues covered in the discipline has expanded to include economic interdependence, international organizations, terrorism, poverty, human rights, and climate change, among others.

International Relations as a discipline is not just about what is happening around the world. We study why countries and national leaders behave the way they do, using different intellectual lenses called theories. When discussing global issues such as nuclear proliferation, terrorism, refugees, hunger, and global warming, there is no such thing as a “correct answer” that satisfies everyone. The important thing is that you respect different viewpoints and work to find common ground. Classroom discussions provide valuable opportunities for students with diverse cultural backgrounds to present their views and learn from each other. The skills learned are extremely useful not only in the way students approach their daily lives, but also in their future workplace, be it a multinational firm, government, or international organization. The International Relations major is for students who want to contribute to international societies as global citizens.

Raised in Hong Kong amid the city’s transition from British rule to the People’s Republic of China and witnessing China’s rise since the early 2000s, my research focuses on Hong Kong’s evolving international status and China’s role as a regional power. Over two decades, I have examined these subjects through interviews conducted in Beijing and a visiting research fellowship at the East Asian Institute of the National University of Singapore, sharing findings globally and publishing in esteemed academic journals. My book, ‘China’s New World Order’, is featured in the European Parliament’s Selected Online Reading. In this rapidly changing world, I engage my students in Model APEC and Model COP simulations to enrich their academic knowledge. These simulations enable students to understand how states organize their foreign policy, fostering in them the development of transferable skills in writing, public speaking, negotiation, and critical analysis of global governance issues.

## Message from the Dean of E-Track - International Relations

My interest in international relations led me to study abroad in Croatia at a time when the country was confronted with the task of dealing with the legacy of armed conflict. It was this experience that led me to ask questions about how societies deal with the legacies of war, and to eventually write a doctoral dissertation on efforts to prosecute war crimes in the former Yugoslavia. Today, I continue to research and write on topics related to post-conflict justice and global governance. I also contribute to both scholarly and more widely read journals such as Foreign Affairs and Foreign Policy. In the classroom, my students are encouraged to discuss contentious issues that are at the forefront of international politics to better understand academic and policy debates, and also to think about how they can apply their own ideas and experiences to addressing real world problems.

## Japanese Language

Students in their first semester will take a Japanese language course. Instructors help students with no prior Japanese experience become fluent by the time they graduate, and support students who have already studied Japanese to achieve even higher levels of proficiency.

The Japanese Language Institute (JLI) supports international students in every aspect regarding Japanese language acquisition. The JLI has two major goals: to help all students build communicative proficiency to benefit their daily lives, and to equip advanced level students with business level proficiency for working in Japan. With these goals in mind, we at the JLI ensure that each student is enrolled in the level most suited to their individual needs. With approximately 20 language instructors, we maintain small classroom sizes to facilitate effective learning. Additionally, we offer one-on-one advising upon request, providing individualized guidance and support. It brings us great joy to work together with international students to keep them motivated in their studies and assist students in making Japanese a lifelong language.

# Four-Year Academic Flow

## Multi-Campus Program

The E-Track Program is a multi-campus program. During the first semester, courses will be held at Campus 1 in Kawagoe City, located in the Greater Tokyo Area just 40 minutes by train from Ikebukuro in central Tokyo. Students will take elementary Japanese language and other fundamental academic courses to prepare for more advanced courses in later years. From the second semester onward, courses will be held at the Ikebukuro Campus located in one of the most important commercial hubs of central Tokyo. Through this multi-campus program, students will experience the local / traditional qualities of Kawagoe and the global / urban environment of Ikebukuro, gaining a more holistic understanding of Japan's local culture and society, as well as its position in the larger global community.

## Advantages

### 1 Take more classes, pay the same tuition

Unlike many universities in other countries, tuition at TIU is a flat rate and is not charged per credit. This means you can take up to 20 credits (or 24 if you are a senior) for no extra cost.

### 2 Take major courses in Japanese

During your time studying at TIU, if you reach a certain level of Japanese language proficiency, you have the option of taking courses to satisfy your major requirements that are taught in the Japanese language.

### 3 Change majors after enrollment

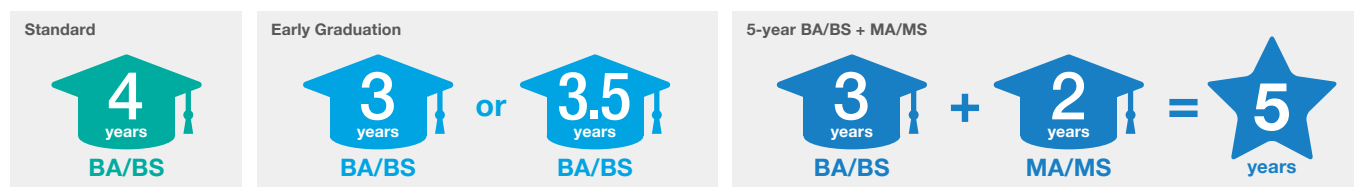
Choosing a major is not a lifetime commitment at TIU. If you decide that your major is not right for you after enrolling, you are able to change majors during your study.

## Study Abroad Programs

TIU is one of the 9 universities in Japan affiliated with ISEP (the International Student Exchange Program), a global organization promoting international exchange for one or two semesters. This program opens up opportunities to study at over 240 of its affiliated universities around the globe. # Career Experience Practicum

The Career Experience Practicum (CEP course) is a course organized in collaboration with employees of leading Japanese companies which allows students to learn about the organization's global operations. The employees give lectures to the students about their company's activities and business strategies. Students work in small groups on projects that address various themes, making proposals for the company's future business. At the end of the course, students make their final presentations and may visit the company. This course is a unique opportunity to interact with corporate employees directly and build skills through project-based group work.



TIU typically partners with a different company each semester for the CEP course. Students in this course learn how to analyze problems, create innovative solutions, and collaborate among team members, which are essential skills for global business leaders. The company employees give advice from their own work experiences while supporting students in their group projects. CEP students gain 'real world' business experience which can motivate them for further study.

### Lhamo from Tibet

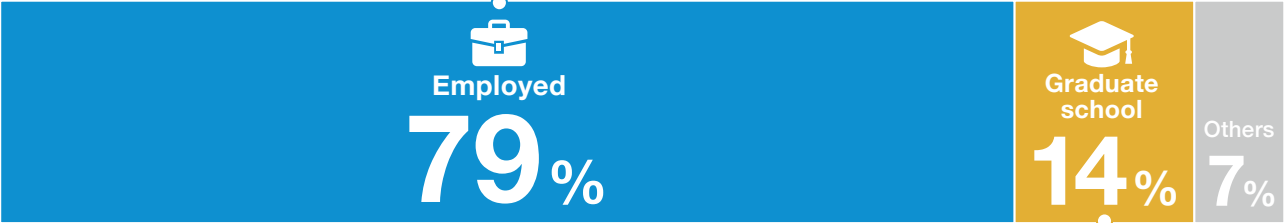

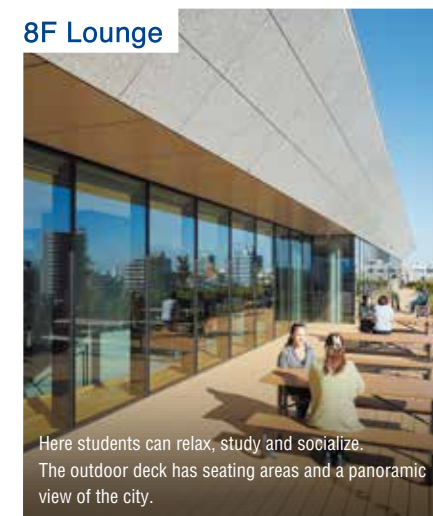
With a capacity of up to 600 people, the TIU Hall is used for a variety of events.

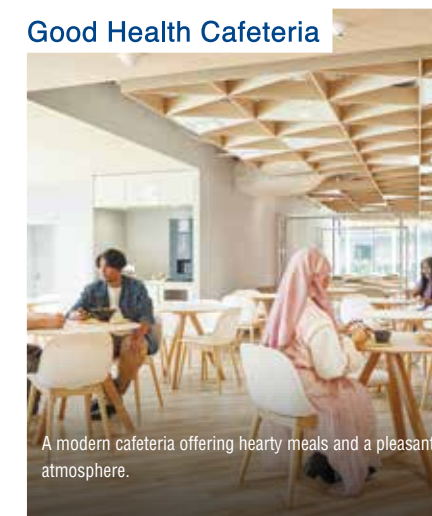
The atrium is at the heart of the campus, connecting the International Tower and the Garden Wing. The campus cafe and TIU Commons can also be found here.

# Scholarships

## University Fees and Scholarships (Freshman)

All students who apply for TIU’s English Track programs are also eligible to apply for a tuition reduction scholarship. The scholarship, if awarded, reduces the tuition fee by 30% to 100% for up to four years for first year students and up to two or three years for transfer students. Scholarship and admission results will be announced simultaneously so students and families can plan accordingly.

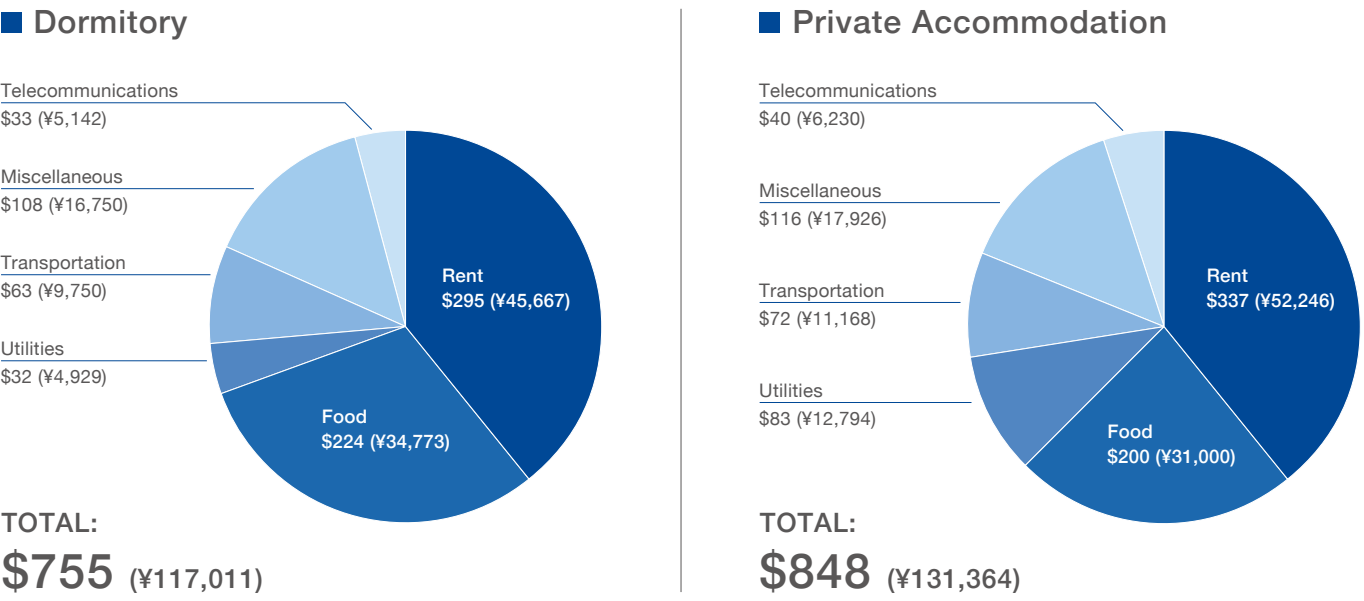
### Japan Student Services Organization (JASSO) Scholarship

In order to fully support international students and help them assimilate to their new home, the Japanese government provides students with an opportunity to apply for the JASSO scholarship which grants a living stipend of 48,000 yen per month for 6 months (September enrollment) or 12 months (April enrollment).

# Cost of Living

TIU provides dormitories that are affordable, safe, convenient, and fully furnished. E-Track students may live in a dormitory for their first semester, after which they can move into private accommodations such as a single or shared apartment. Living in the dorm is not required; students may opt for private accommodations from the start of their studies. Although Tokyo is a major global city, the cost of living is surprisingly affordable. The cost of living will also fluctuate on individual lifestyle choices: for example, how often you cook at home or eat at restaurants.

TIU strives to place all students who want to live in a dormitory, however if space is unavailable, TIU will connect students with a trusted English-speaking housing partner to help them find private housing that fits their needs.

## Part-Time Work

International students in Japan on student visas may legally work up to 28 hours per week during the semester and up to 40 hours per week during the breaks between semesters. To work part-time, students must first obtain a special permit from Japan’s Immigration Bureau called "permission to engage in activities other than that permitted under the status of residence previously granted". This permit may be obtained at the international airport upon arrival or at the nearest Immigration Bureau office. Working part-time is a great way to gain experience and help cover your expenses. The minimum wage may vary by city and prefecture. As of October 2024, the minimum wage in Tokyo is JPY 1,163 per hour. Some jobs may pay more than the minimum wage. Examples of jobs include language tutoring, retail, and food services. There are paid opportunities on campus as well through the TIU Student Leadership Internship program, such as being a writing tutor, assisting new students, and helping to operate the English Plaza. Many E-Track students with varying levels of Japanese ability work part-time at some point during their time at TIU.
